EDUARDO CASTILLO

is a computer science and mathematics double major from Maracaibo, Venezuela. The Bonner Scholars Program and Wofford have served as platforms for Castillo to reach his full potential. During his time at Wofford, he has been invited to attend several conferences, including a National

Science Foundation-sponsored conference at Boston University. Twitter's #LikeABoss, Twitter's #TakeFlight, Special Interest Group of Computer Science Education 2017, Out 4 Undergrad 2017 and 2018, Brown University's 2019 Hackathon and Startup Fest 2017. Castillo also has participated in the selective Association for Computer Machinery (ACM) Undergraduate Student Research Competition, where he published his computer science research. At Wofford, Castillo completed an internship as a software engineer at Slack Technologies in San Francisco, Calif. He also has been active in the Wofford community by serving as a resident assistant for two consecutive years and as a member of the Campus Union Student Affairs Committee 2017-2018 and the International Student Committee 2017-2019. Castillo also has served as chair of the ACM. Chapter at Wofford since 2017. He was the first speaker of the Humans of Wofford series and was part of the inaugural class of The Space in the Mungo Center's Certificate of Entrepreneurial Thinking program. Liberia Eco-Tours and a another in Senegal with the Red Cross. After graduation, Davidson will pursue a career in nursing after continuing her education in an accelerated bachelor of science in nursing program at Emory University.



ALEXIS EATON

is a government major and sociology minor from Chattanooga, Tenn. As a Bonner Scholar, she has served on the Bonner Leadership Team, holding the position of co-mentorship coordinator and Bonner Congress representative. She has volunteered at AccessHealth Spartanburg,

the Butterfly Foundation and Greater Spartanburg Ministries. Eaton is working on a senior research project assessing potential food insecurity on Wofford's campus as well as other colleges and universities across the country. After Wofford, Eaton plans to take a gap year to work and explore career opportunities, then apply for graduate school.
